This general area is listed in nearly every CA rockhound field guide, with most focusing on the Green Ash Hills and some on the more southern spot near the power lines. Nearly anywhere you look north of the freeway here has potential for decent finds, especially after the seasonal rains. While no recent rains had churned up the ground here members and guests alike did not to seem to have any trouble locating pieces they liked.





Plans for an upcoming night-time trip to the Princess Pat mine for fluorescents

Hey Rockhounds!

We would like to make another field trip this season to the Princess Pat mine for the fluorescent minerals scheelite, wollastonite, calcite, and quartz. We will probably do this trip in December. It will be a night time trip and a short wave uv lamp will be required. Please note: a short wave lamp will produce filtered uv in the 254 nm range. Currently any uv lamps available at Home Depot, Amazon, Harbor Freight, etc are long wave uv lights and YOU WILL NOT GET GOOD RESULTS for the minerals found at the Princess Pat as these minerals all fluoresce best with the short wave. I picked up my short wave 11 watt light at




UVTOOLS.COM and it cost about eighty dollars. They also offer a dual short/long wave lamp for a similar price range and offer payment plans for the buyer. This is actually a good price for a 11 watt lamp and it works much better than the smaller handheld flashlight style lamps and also comes with a regular flashlight built in which is handy because you will be collecting at night.










Quartzite with help from Janet Flecher

In about a month, the new year 2025, will usher in the craziness that is Quartzite, Arizona. In an effort to help newcomers, and even folks such as me, who have visited a couple of times, Janet shared her knowledge of the town and the massive event that takes up, importantly to us rockhounds, all of January. The Event is divided into eight shows. We will cover three well-known ones, Desert Gardens, Tyson Wells and The Pow Wow.

Desert Gardens, which calls themselves the fifth largest show of its kind in the world, begins on January 1st and runs through February 28th. According to Janet the best time for rocks is to get there the first week. There will be over 150 vendors showing their wares.

The Tyson Wells Rock and Gem Show begins on the 3rd of January and runs through the 12th. They do business from 9AM to 5PM daily. With 396 spaces T. W. is a huge venue with over two miles of walking required to see it all. As before, the best time to get there is at the beginning, in this case Jan. 3rd.

The third show we discussed was The Pow Wow. It runs for 5 days, beginning on January 15th, running through the 19th. 640 vendors are expected here and of course, the best day to visit is day one, Wednesday the 15th.

In our discussion Janet said, being there early is the best for selection, walk the entire show if possible before purchasing anything, having some experience helps with finding and buying the quality material you want. She also said not to be afraid to negotiate and to avoid "brick and mortar" stores, as their operations require a higher markup.

We'll have an article about "Tucson" next month.

Here's a couple of tips from your editor:

- **Blythe is on the California side of the river and is in the Pacific time zone. Quartzite is an hour ahead, in the Mountain Time Zone.
- **It's about 255 miles from Victorville to Quartzite, 232 miles to Blythe.
- **A good number of VVGMC members have stated they are going to visit the shows in Quartzite. You might wish to seek out folks to meet there, especially those who have some experience.

Knapper's Corner Ken Villars

This month's article could be considered a continuation of last month's article, focusing in on **Flake Terminations**.

When a flake doesn't feather out cleanly to nothing, it leaves a bit of a mess. One very common form is the "**Step**". A small low step might be considered a "Hinge", and a series of steps alongside each other is often called a "stack", or "plateau".


Other than knapping skill, the occurrence of steps is dependent on the brittleness of the material, the shape and composition of the tool, and platform preparation (strength and suitability).

It is very difficult (bordering on impossible for beginner to intermediate knappers) to hit a clean flake into a step to remove it. The best way to remove a step using knapping techniques is to go under it from the other side of the piece. This requires that you can drive flakes long enough to reach. The two photos with obsidian show pressure flakes that were too short. In the cropped blade, you can see some flakes that met and joined scars (right side), and some that didn't quite reach and made a mess (left side). This photo also has an example on the right of an "overshot" flake, which is pretty much the opposite of a short flake. It was so strong it carried all the way across and removed part of the far edge (accidental and unwelcome in this case).

The pieces labeled "Porcelain" and "Tough Texas Chert" are pressure work by knappers other than myself. The rest are my mess, with the obsidian being pressure and the rest being percussion (which I do prior to pressure work).

Since we have access to lapidary equipment, there are several ways to grind off steps, stacks, and other messes. In fact, the percussion examples shown were pulled from my pile destined for such treatment at the club shop.
